What kind of people does Christ call us to be?

This question set the theme for the evening in our devotions and then remained at the back of our thoughts through the business of the meeting.

A number of exciting opportunities were discussed, including the Church weekend away in Scarborough in September, Jubilee Celebrations in June, Special Services at various times, the local Olympic Torch event.

We heard a very positive report from "Crossing the Bridge", our Sunday evening Youth Fellowship group - more of that on the back page of this Newsletter.

Details were shared of the latest Emmaus Group sessions entitled 'If you want to walk on water, you have to get out of the boat' - dates are in the diary.

Grateful thanks were expressed to our Stewards and helpers, as well as all the other key personnel who work to maintain the mission of this church.

After confirming the Church Council decision to wait until October before discussing the building plans any further, by which time the full feasibility study will have been completed, Sandie asked us to break into small groups to discuss a couple of questions to help us begin to think about what we are here for. She offers the following thoughts as a way forward from this.

Developing our vision of what we are here for ...

Do you have a clear idea of where this church is 'going'? Are we just keeping pace with our existing commitments and activities or do we feel we have a clear vision of which direction God might be calling us to now? Probably, our answers would be mixed. To help us with these questions and others we might have been considering, such as a possible building scheme, Sandie is offering four sessions called the 'Square Mile' which helps us focus on our calling to be salt and light in our community.

The four sessions use a combination of:

- Thought provoking discussion questions
- · In depth Bible study
- Interviews with leading thinkers and activists (on DVD)
- · Inspiring stories from around the UK

giving us the opportunity and equipping us to develop a clearer vision of living out our calling and planning together to take action.

These sessions are for anyone who is keen to contribute to the growing life and witness of this church. *Provisional dates* are:

Dear Friends,

This will be the last contribution I will write for the Circuit Newsletter and so I want to begin by thanking you all for the friendship and support that you have given to me and to John over the years. We will be sad to leave the "Airedale family", we have spent many happy years living and working in various parts of the Circuit. We are sure we are leaving you in good and caring hands and we look forward to the challenges of a new situation. We are beginning to sort out our cupboards and decide what will be coming with us and what will not! Some will be thrown away - some might be of use to others and so it will go to be recycled! It's good to think that things we no longer need can often be used to help others.

I write this letter shortly after the Circuit consultation on the future and the leadership team want to say a big thank you for being so positive. We recognise there are fears but were delighted that, on the whole, each fear was accompanied by the sentiment that "we will give it a try". There was a clear recognition that things are going to be different and that change is inevitable and can be very exciting.

Two things came out of the meeting. The first was that it became clear there was some confusion about the roles of a Presbyter and a Deacon, and the second was about the use of talents and gifts.

The Methodist Church has two orders of ministry: presbyteral and diaconal. The two orders are equal in status yet with differences in focus, style and

character. What follows is very simplistic - there was a report to Conference in 2002 entitled "What is a Presbyter', followed in 2004 by one called 'What is a Deacon' - they both run to several pages, so to sum them up in a few lines does both a disservice!

The main difference between them is that a Presbyter's ordination allows them to take a Communion service. Traditionally Deacons have taken a more pastoral role (e.g. visiting the sick, etc.) where Presbyters have taken a more preaching and teaching role. This distinction is still valid but there are presbyters who have a pastoral ministry and Deacons who have a teaching orientated ministry, although not all Deacons preach. Deacons have a specific project they are assigned to or are responsible for a particular area of work in the Circuit. Each ministry is of equal status, they are just different.

Methodists also like to talk about the 'Priesthood of all believers' and firmly believe that whilst some individuals are called out for an ordained ministry in the Church (eg. Presbyters and Deacons) every Methodist has a ministry to perform within the Church. A ministry in this sense is a task to do what God wants that person to perform. That brings me to the second point - the use of our talents and gifts.

Someone said to me after the meeting "one thing we need in the Circuit is a 'shwopping' service (as in the latest M&S advert where we are encouraged to take an old garment in for recycling when we buy a new one!) We do not always know what gifts members of the Circuit have and how there might be people willing to do something for other congregations in return for some offer of help for their own Church. For example - one Church might struggle to get someone to look after finances but have some very practical people; another Church might have a very competent treasurer but has no-one who can do a minor repair to the property. If we knew who those people were we could arrange a talent swap and everyone would gain.

We live in changing but exciting times - as I said at the meeting. God never called anyone to stay where they are or to go back to what they had been. God's call is ALWAYS to change. As I prepare to change location and move to a different place I will continue to pray for you all as you prepare for changes and I am sure that God will bless you as you walk with Him into an exciting but different future.

LEARNING AND CARING

SUMMARY OF PRESENTATION - THE FUTURE by Ruth Parry to Airedale Circuit Meeting - March 2012

In the report 'Contemporary Discipleship - A Discipleship Movement Shaped for Mission' the General Secretary of the Methodist Church, Martyn Atkins, points out that 'being shaped is not always comfortable but that we must stop doing some things so that we can do other things better' - he points out that change is exciting and challenging, but can also be uncomfortable and unsettling.

Becoming a new Circuit was an opportunity for some of that to happen - we decided to give some space - some freedom from committees and meetings as we tried to discern which direction God wanted the Airedale Circuit to go. So, two years on, where are we?

One of the questions people are asking in this Circuit is 'who will be our Minister?' Maybe the time has come to think through what we mean by that. What we need to be asking more urgently is 'What is our Mission?' and 'How do we share ALL our gifts.' One of the great things about the Methodist Church - one that sets us apart from many other denominations is our doctrine of 'The Priesthood of all Believers' - it means we are ALL ministers together - lay and ordained and our ministry is the Mission of God and that is hard work.

"Methodism began as a movement - a movement that in obedience to God, wanted to make a difference in the world in the lives of individuals and communities." *Martyn Atkins*

John Wesley said "Go not to those who need you but to those who need you most". We need to work out who needs us most and if we are really honest about that I suspect it won't be those we have traditionally expected to minister to.

We need to work out what OUR Mission is, where the energy of the Holy Spirit is. We need some buildings as bases - but we have too many. If we are not engaging with those around us we are not doing the work we are called to. We might have hundreds of people crossing our thresholds each week - but if we are not engaging with them in a gospel way we are not being church - we are a letting agency. It's often easier to start a new thing than to maintain or renovate something that exists and we expend a lot of energy maintaining and renovating. Is the maintenance of some of our buildings akin to maintaining telephone boxes in an age of mobile phones?

Jesus never promised that the work we are called to would be easy but He did promise that He would be with us whilst we do it. Maybe we haven't worked hard enough to make this Circuit work - and by WE - I mean every single person who is a part of the Church is called to a part of God's mission.

So what questions do we have to address in Airedale at this time?

Well - first of all money. We are grateful to Clare Dewhirst - our finances are not good but we know where we are! BUT - it is at least two years since Clare

said she wanted to give up being treasurer. It is unfair that she is still in the post. If we think of the Circuit as a family we should help each other.

The first call on the money of each congregation is the Circuit assessment - the strong should help the weak, but that means being honest with each other about what we have - reserves, apart from the statutory 'six months in hand', are part of what we have to share. Charity law does not allow us to keep significantly more in the bank than the statutory amount.

For various reasons, the teams we tried to set up (Mission and Ministry and Learning and Development) haven't worked - there are several reasons for this. The responsibility for this does not lay at the feet of those charged with their advent! Some churches and people engaged but not many - maybe we need different teams to look at strategy and management - that might be a better way forward. What I do know is that it is everyone's responsibility.

From September the staff team will look very different. It's exciting to think of such a mixture - a presbyter in Rosemary Nash, a deacon in Claire Gill and a probationer in Saidu Kanu. Deacons do not work like presbyters and although Claire has said she is happy to have pastoral charge of a couple of small churches her focus in the Circuit will be different. Saidu is a probationer minister - probationer ministers are still ministers in training and as such are supposed to have a 0.75 workload and also require supervision. Jacky and Sandy will still be here, Claire Voss returns from maternity leave in the middle of April, but she will be returning to work half-time and the Circuit Meeting approved the appointment of Tanya as a part time worker in the Circuit should she have her call to ordination affirmed by Connexion - most of you will know that happened so Tanya will be working in the Circuit as she trains.

We are losing two Circuit Stewards, Debbie and Darrell, who have seen the Circuit through times of change and we are grateful to them - we still have Graham, Janet and Ron left but need others to maintain the strength of the team. We are working on what being a team means.

I quoted a phrase from the film 'The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel' - which becomes an underlying attitude during the film - 'it will be alright in the end, so if it's not alright, it's not the end.' At 'The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel' the hopes and dreams of youth (the Hotel's visionary manager) stand in juxtaposition to the regrets and fears of old age - how true this is of the world we live in - and of the Church.

Within the story this isn't just a glib saying, neither is it a fatalistic call to sit back and let life take its course. We are reminded that we cannot choose what happens to us, but we can choose how we respond. It reminded me that as Christians we have a great deal of hope regarding the future, BUT, we can't just sit back and wait for it, we have to make the most of whatever comes my way. Every moment, every challenge, even every mistake, is an opportunity to do something great, and move onto something even greater.

For the Airedale Circuit 'It will be alright in the end' but just at the moment it's not - but then - it's not the end - is it?


Finally the day came when the boy didn't lose his temper at all. He told his father about it and the father suggested that the boy now pull out one nail for each day that he was able to hold his temper.

A year ago we started 'Crossing the Bridge', an open ecumenical Youth Fellowship for Oakworth.
