Minister's Letter

Dear Friends.

You have a little bit better idea now of how the changes in staffing will affect you in September. At one level it doesn't look very different as I will still be your minister. You will have the added name of Kanu, the new probationary minister. What input Kanu might have at Oakworth is still to be worked out between the two of us, but it is likely to have a focus on youth.



The point of having two named paid staff for each church is that we as a circuit are beginning the process of working much more collaboratively as a team, using people's gifts, skills and experiences as effectively as possible. You also need to be aware that as well as the five churches I already care for, I shall have some minor input at Steeton and Ilkley Road.

It's very important for you to know that this is not primarily about **organizational** change. We are not proposing change 'for change's sake'. Nor have we been just 'shuffling the cards' to cope with the comings and goings of staff, and the resulting increased pressure on staff to stretch themselves thinner over more and more churches. We've looked far beyond placing names by churches, to the way we work as a circuit, including ministerial, diaconal and lay people – all called to be a 'holy priesthood.' We are aiming to respond creatively to change, which inevitably involves some risk-taking.



So I'm re-stating here what I said at the follow up to the Circuit consultation, and giving you an idea of the **vision** which lies behind these changes. The Circuit Leadership Team is looking towards:

A circuit which is energized by faith in which the motivation and energy comes from the desire to serve God and one another.

That might sound obvious, but in fact, although churches usually start off that way, they can very easily be diverted so that everything becomes an enormous effort:

'our church (circuit) is like a wheelbarrow, nothing moves unless you push it!'

A circuit energized by faith nurtures faith in Christ, helping people to engage with Scripture in creative ways that connect with life; and helps people to grow in, and share, their faith.

A circuit in which different gifts, experiences, faith journeys, and skills of both lay and ordained are valued, nurtured, developed and shared for the good of all.

Those whose faith is real want to do something about it and are also willing to take responsibility (rather than expecting the leaders to take it all).

We believe that working much more closely as a team will enable those gifts and skills to be shared more effectively. But bearing in mind our distinctive Methodist emphasis on the priesthood of all believers, the team can't be complete without you. We need you to reflect prayerfully on your gifts/experience etc so that *together* we can serve our communities.

❖ A circuit which is outward looking - a circuit 'shaped for mission' (Martyn Atkins, General Secretary of Methodist Church)

A circuit which is fully engaged with our communities/the world in a gospel way.

So the focus is primarily on looking outwards, rather than inwards to churches. The emphasis is on being salt and light in the world, rather than just keeping things going or trying to survive.

ALL are called to share in this mission as disciples of Jesus. The leaders, both ordained and lay, are to be primarily 'mission enablers' helping the circuit/churches to see where God's Spirit is already at work in the world and becoming co-workers. Therefore, the leaders will give top priority in time and resources to those areas of church life which are directly involved in mission.

There's a great deal more work to be done on this and we won't get it 'right' first time. None of this is 'written in stone' and we will need to seek God's continuing guidance together as we seek to be shaped by Him to be the kind of church which can 'serve the present age'. Our hope, as a Circuit Leadership Team, is that you will all want to take your part in this and look forward in hope to wherever God is leading us.

The procession was followed by the usual entertainment and children's races - and the afternoon was enjoyed by all.



Dear Friends,

'You redeemed the human race for God, and have chosen us to be a holy priesthood from every people and nation.' Methodist Worship Book for HC Ordinary Seasons (3)

After the circuit consultation and the follow up evening, you may still be wondering why all this talk about 'working as a team'. Is this just a fad or a whim? The roots of it were touched upon in Ruth's presentation to the March Circuit Meeting, which was subsequently printed in the Circuit News. She wrote "One of the great things about the Methodist Church ... is our doctrine of the 'Priesthood of All Believers' ... that means we are ALL ministers together - lay and ordained and our ministry is the Mission of God ..."

So where does this idea of a 'holy priesthood' come from - and what has it got to do with working as a team? Well, as you might expect from a doctrine that was dear to John Wesley's heart, it has deep Biblical roots. The obvious place to go to would be in 1 Peter 2:5-9.

'Let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ ... But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood ... God's own people.'

But like many other sayings in the New Testament, to understand what the writer meant, we have to look at the background in the Hebrew Scriptures. It all

begins in Genesis where we see God intends a relationship of unbroken intimacy between himself and humanity.

Sadly, human beings use their God-given freedom to rebel, disobey and turn their backs on the Creator. Now human beings are separated from God and there is a need for someone to bridge that gap - a 'gatekeeper' if you like, who will act as a go-between to bring the concerns and commands of God to the people, and the people's concern to God. This gatekeeper role eventually becomes that of the priestly tribe in Hebrew religion, who on behalf of the whole nation were to be intermediaries for the world, 'light to the nations'.

By New Testament times, the priesthood was the prerogative of wealthy aristocratic families who were in charge of the system, including sacrifice, which gate-kept the gap between people and God. The Temple was the place where God could be met. Only there could the gap be bridged and only the priest could do this through sacrificial mediation.

By Jesus' actions and words, the gate-keeping role of the priests was challenged as Jesus claimed for himself that role. He Himself was the 'Gate', the 'Door' between God and his people. The cross became the entrance into God's holy presence as signified by the tearing of the temple curtain from top to bottom. So now there is no need for any gatekeeper other than The Risen and Ascended Christ who is the great 'High Priest' as the writer of Hebrews puts it.

According to the letter to the Hebrews, there is a new priesthood, defined by the Spirit. This new priesthood consists of all believers who are brothers and sisters of Christ. Their duties involve praise and spiritual sacrifice after the pattern of Jesus, taking up their crosses (Matt.16:24) and laying down their lives (Romans 12:1). All Christians, ordained or lay, are called to mediate by prayerfully bringing the concerns of the people to God, and by word and deed, bringing the concerns of God to the world. So in New Testament thinking, the title of priest is connected with task, not role. Christ alone has the role of 'High Priest' (ie. 'Gatekeeper'), while Christians share the task of offering this open gate to the world.

The implication of all this, is not that we shouldn't have leaders who might be called ministers, pastors or even priests, but that we should be clear that all believers are under the authority of Christ the Way, the Gate, and the Door to God and we all share the 'priestly' task. Leadership is a specific task within the church.

Priesthood is the corporate task of the whole church. 'It is the task, in collaboration with the Spirit, of sharing with others what we know of the one high priest and sacrifice, Jesus, and pointing to Him as the open curtain into the Holy Presence of God.' $_{\rm 1}$

What we are trying to do in the Circuit is to put this into practice with a vision of circuit where all of us exercise this priesthood of believers under the authority of Christ and the guidance of the Spirit. We have made a small beginning with paid staff working closer together. We shall be looking for ways to extend this so that all of us believers are using our varied gifts, skills and experience both to build each other up and go out into God's world to His glory.

A WORD FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT MINISTER

HAPPY NEW YEAR!

No I haven't misread my diary - 1st September marks the beginning of the new year in the Methodist Church. As with any new year, we might want to look forward and think of the many things which may happen in the life of our churches and circuit during the next 12 months. For me, there are two items uppermost in my thoughts:

- · welcoming the new members of staff
- · working collaboratively (as a team) throughout the circuit

No doubt you will have your own thoughts and questions:

- what will our new minister be like?
- what differences will 'team ministry' make to me /my church?

The answers to these questions - and countless others - will emerge as we work together and the year unfolds but, of one thing we can be certain, there will be some changes in how we do things. However we must not lose sight of the fact that we should be focusing on one thing - God's mission, and the part He invites us to play in it.

When Jesus said, "I will build my church" (Matt 16:18), He wasn't referring to a physical building but to people who would believe in Him - trusting Him and doing His will. Somehow we have become so absorbed in organisation and buildings that we forget people and the mission Christ committed to us; we have changed the focus from 'Christ's' church to 'our' church.

We need to begin again with Jesus' words, "I will build my church". Earlier he had said to His disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest field" (Matt 10:37-38). In Acts we read of the risen Christ saying to His disciples, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). So the focus is meant to be on the Lord - It is His church and His harvest and we are supposed to be bearing witness to Him. The Bible makes it clear that we are to go "to all peoples everywhere and make them My disciples" (Matt 28:19). So it is Christ who is building His church in 2012/13. The question is whether we are growing to know Him more and to be more available to Him as His willing witnesses and workers in His mission.

Christ is building His church. Let's keep our focus on Him. Let's seek every opportunity to work together, to grow in faith, to be part of a team - Christ's team. It's a new year in the life of the church! Let's keep in step with Jesus!

SMALL MIRACLES - LIFE IN EL SALVADOR, CENTRAL AMERICA

El Salvador is located next to the Pacific Ocean, adjacent to Guatemala and Honduras, and is about one-sixth the size of England. It is situated along the 'Ring of Fire' where 90% of the world's largest earthquakes occur, and 20% of its people live on less than 81p a day!

In 2009 tropical storm Ida struck, and in 2010 Agatha also struck, causing devastating damage to homes and crops.

Since 2004 the Methodist Relief and Development Fund has been helping farmers to develop agricultural practices that lead to increased crop yields, while protecting the environment. MRDF's partner works with some of the poorest communities. The farmers learn how to grow indigenous crops without using expensive fertilisers, Workshops cover such subjects as soil conservation, seed-storing techniques and rice growing. MRDF has helped many people to recover after the disasters, by providing seeds to plant for the next harvest, and the skills they have learnt have helped people to rebuild lost livelihoods.

Please pray for the work of MRDF, at work across several parts of the world. Please support their work financially if you feel you can.
