Minister's Letter

Dear Friends.

'Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.' (Luke 23:43)

So Jesus responds to the 'good' criminal on the cross. As we contemplate the cross we can stand in different places in the scene before us. For, whatever else it was, crucifixion was a spectacle, designed to be watched. The suffering bodies were held up high, in a public



place, carefully staged for maximum effect. So where are we in the scene?

Preachers have sometimes invited us to think of ourselves as the frightened

disciples, cowering at the very edge of the scene, terrified of being identified with Jesus and sharing his fate. Yes, I can acknowledge that is me sometimes. Are we amongst the women who wait and weep, feeling every part of Jesus' suffering as their own? Well, I'd like to think that's where I might be.

There are times though, when I could well be with Pontius Pilate, washing my hands of the whole gory business, claiming that I have no responsibility for the evil in the world. I hardly dare think that I might be with the religious leaders, so intent on preserving what I hold dear that I completely miss the Truth before my eyes – yet I know that it's within the realms of possibility.

If we are ruthlessly honest with ourselves and able to acknowledge the darkness within each of us, we may see that we could be the 'good' criminal crucified with Jesus. We may have the grace to know that, given certain circumstances, we could and would so betray the image of God within us, that there would be no hope for us other than in the boundless mercy of our God.

But what about the 'bad' criminal? Could that be us too - too proud, too blinkered, too bitter to acknowledge our need of forgiveness?

As we come before the cross this Passiontide, let us come not as voyeurs of Christ's suffering, watching from a safe place. But let us come to stand in that painful and uncomfortable place, where like the thief who begged Jesus for pardon, we acknowledge our part in it all, and so open ourselves to the tender mercy of our God. May we too hear the live-giving words of Jesus spoken to us.

Inn Churches, Keighley

This was part of Bradford 'Inn Churches'. The aim: to provide beds and meals 'in churches' in the coldest months - one week being in Keighley for the first time. During the last week in January, twelve 'guests' arrived at All Saints Church at 6.00 pm, were welcomed and given a hot meal. Camp beds, clean bedding, towels, games and videos were provided and volunteers



were on hand to chat. 11.00 pm was lights out with two shifts of volunteers on hand overnight. Early morning - yet more helpers arrived to cook a hot breakfast and the quests left at 9.00 am.

I wasn't sure what to expect but when I arrived on Tuesday at 10.00 pm for the night shift I found a quiet, pleasant environment with guests chatting, playing games, watching videos or enjoying an early night. Overnight was uneventful and we all enjoyed a hot breakfast together.

Sunday was music night with local musicians coming in. This was a lovely evening. Again, guests and volunteers were playing games, chatting and singing together. Some of the East European men sang in their own language; one of the women guests said she didn't understand a word but it spoke to her heart.

It was good to meet volunteers from other churches, 70 people being involved altogether. The organisation was excellent and any problems were quickly dealt with. It is hoped to run it again next year for two weeks. Both Sandie and myself found it a worthwhile and interesting experience. Kath.


