### Pastoral Letter

Dear friends,

When the date of the election was announced, there was concern about the disruption it might cause to school nativity plays. That set me thinking: if ever there was a story of disruption, it's the story of the nativity! First, a visit from an angel turns the world upside down for Mary and Joseph. Then comes a long, difficult journey to Bethlehem for the census. There's all the disruption of a birth in a borrowed room, where the only place for the baby is a manger. An angel chorus breaks into the



musings of shepherds on the night shift and urges them to leave their sheep and go and look for a baby. Wise men from a distant country leave their studies and follow a star on a long arduous journey to find a new born King. There's disruption caused by jealousy, hatred and fear. There's a hasty flight to Egypt to escape from a tyrant and then a new start, learning to live as refugees, constantly waiting for news that it's safe to return home. The story behind the nativity plays is certainly a story of disruption, but in amongst the disruption is a story of hope.

In our own times of uncertainty and change, the Christmas story reminds us how God refused to turn his back on a world which had gone wrong. God chose to enter into a world filled with uncertainty, political turmoil, divisions and hopelessness to show us there is another way. God didn't turn up as a strong, powerful leader, ready to order everyone about: he chose to come to us, in Jesus, as a vulnerable baby, trusting himself to our human love and care and in his turn, teaching us how to love in God's way. He didn't just drop in for a fleeting visit, on a busy schedule: he came to stay. The Christmas story reminds us that no matter what anyone else may say: goodness *is* stronger than evil and love *is* stronger than hate. Jesus came to disrupt hopelessness with hope, corruption with truth, greed with generosity, division with love and darkness with light and he invites us to do the same. Let's make a start this Christmas and let the echoes of the angel song be heard once again in the world around us.

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace, goodwill among people.'

#### **Mission Possible Fundraising**

#### **Oakworth Methodist Church**

As most of you will know, with the exception of a few snagging items, the contractors completed their building work in March ready for the Re-dedication Weekend in April. Most of the work the church took responsibility for, such as shelving, cupboards, decorating and garden planting was completed over the Summer and Building Control signed off the completed work in September. We are still waiting for the contractors to return to complete the snagging items and they have still to meet with our project consultant to reach an agreement over the final value of the contract so that we can make the final payment.

The main contractor has been paid by the church for all the work of their sub-contractors but we are aware that not all sub-contractors have been paid by the main contractor yet. In some cases, this has caused real hardship for the sub-contractors as well as difficulties for the church. We are all working to try and resolve these issues as soon as possible.

One issue which could have been a major problem for us has now been resolved - HMRC have confirmed that the VAT rates we have been using all through the contract period are correct - the Annexe is zero rated and there will be no additional liability for VAT.

The total budget figure we are currently working with for the completed works is £470,000. There will be additional costs to cover works to be funded by specific grants - such as the ventilation work being funded by the Co-op funds received last month but such grants can only go towards work not already done.

#### **Co-op Local Community Fund**

The 2019 funding round raised a further £2,625 for **Mission Possible** towards improving ventilation in Church for our large drama productions. A BIG thank you to Co-op members for helping us raise this brilliant sum. This brings the total raised for **Mission Possible** through the Co-op Local Community Fund to a fantastic £11,125. Sadly, our bid to share in the 2020 funding round was not successful.



## **Church Fundraising Events**

#### Yorkshireman Marathon

Our intrepid catering team were out in force at Haworth in September, preparing and serving breakfast as the runners set off and soup and cake on their return, raising £1,185 for church funds.

#### **Sunshine Bags**

Maureen & Rodney thank those who brought Sunshine Bags to the Coffee Morning in October for emptying. £158 was counted from the bags and all enjoyed the fellowship over coffee.

#### **Autumn Fayre**

The November Autumn Fayre was very well attended and everyone enjoyed browsing round the stalls and picking up a few bargains in the process. There was a lovely atmosphere and something for all ages to enjoy - Harry is delighted with his purchase on the cake stall (see photo) - and the coffee and scones were very popular. £380 was raised (as well as the craft stall proceeds). Thank you to everyone for your support in stocking the stalls, helping on the day or coming along to make it such a successful morning.









#### **Pantomime News**

The last month has been a bit of a roller coaster ride! The scripts were all printed in October ready for rehearsals to start when we discovered that Judith, Lisa and five of the cast needed to pull out for personal reasons. We miss them all very much particularly Judith who has directed/choreographed the shows for 18 years, making a huge contribution to the success of our pantomimes.

We are delighted that Christine Aspinall has agreed to step in as choreographer - she has an impressive CV and the cast love working with her!



Three more cast members have joined us (eleven of the cast are new to the team this year now!) and others have bigger roles. We are confident that the show will still be as good as ever and look forward to seeing you all in February. Oh yes we do!

#### Treasurer's Report

We give thanks once again for the commitment and support of so many people which has enabled us to turn the previous year's £1,000 shortfall on the revenue account into a £350 surplus, as well as raising a further £23,000 locally during the year towards the Mission Possible Appeal.

#### **Receipts & Payments**

All receipts and payments streams were broadly in line with the budgeted figures.

Collections and Fundraising were both up £500 on the previous year and, following our agreement last year to do all the Keighley Playhouse programme, ticket and publicity printing, Printing receipts rose by £2,700. Conversely, revenue Donations dropped by £700.

Utility costs rose, as did Stationery/ Printing costs (for Playhouse) but all last year's Project costs related to **Mission Possible** payments, enabling us to use the revenue Project Income towards the general revenue budget.

#### Summary

The £350 surplus enabled us to top up our General Reserves to a small extent, bringing them up to £594 - still less than a week of our £41,300 budgeted expenditure for the current year. We aim to hold three months of the budgeted expenditure figure so we need to work at replenishing our reserves as circumstances allow.

Total Reserves were, of course, much higher because they still include £22,282 of funds held for the Mission Possible building project as well as £620 of other restricted funds.

However, included in the Mission Possible income for last year is the Airedale Circuit Loan of £35,000 which will have to be repaid over the next few years from continued fundraising.

We ask for your continuing prayerful support through the current year so that

our revenue expenses continue to be covered as we concentrate our efforts on reaching our Mission Possible Appeal target.



#### **Oakworth Methodist Church**

The 2019 Co-op Local Community Funding round finished last month, raising £2,625 for the Mission Possible Appeal. We expect to hear responses to two other grant applications this month. Fundraising this quarter has brought in £2,027 - boosting the Mission Possible local fundraising and donations figure to £113,486, and the total amount secured to date to £439,446. Included in those figures is £6,750 which has has been donated so far towards the £7,900 cost of the stunning Stained Glass Panels. The total project budget currently stands at £470,000 so we still have a little way to go to reach our target. Donations are still welcome at any time! The shortfall has been covered in the short term by a generous loan from the Airedale Circuit.

The main contract work has been completed but there is more still to do before the whole project will be finished. Thank you for your support and prayers - both are still needed!
