Pastoral Letter


Dear friends,

Finance



Thoughts now turn to our 2024 Pantomime - Cinderella. Judith needs to reduce her panto commitment time next year so we won't see as much of her. It has been my pleasure to work alongside her since she joined the team in 2001. We are delighted to welcome Anne Mody and Phil Smith as they join the production team to cover most of Judith's choreography and director roles. They bring a wealth of experience with them and we look forward to working on Cinderella together. Work will

begin on updating the script after Easter. Look out for news on auditions for the existing cast next month. New cast auditions will then follow in June.

Pantomime Review

It's February half term - which only means one thing - Panto time at Oakworth Methodist Church. This is a panto where all the cast are children or teens, with many new faces in the main parts as older members have left for Uni or College.

David Howarth, Judith Chapman, Janet Armstrong and team of scenery constructors, painters, lighting, sound, special effects, front of house back stage and dressing room people have brought together another fabulous show. David



never lets the action drop in the script, whilst Judith's direction and choreography allows all the cast to join in with the dancing and staging. Janet, as always, makes sure that the cast are all brightly dressed in true panto style. Well done to everyone.

All the cast have chance to shine, with lines, songs and dances and all did so with exuberance. I especially liked the dancing rats (both times) and the policeman scene (good comic timing). These all had to double up (and more) on parts playing Londoners, Undersea life, slaves, rats, police, extra sailors and Moroccan Sultans and warriors. All done brilliantly.

Alongside these were the four main sailors, Captain Cockle, Muriel Mussel, Bill Barnacle and Winnie Winkle from the Pickled Herring, whose jokes and banter added to the comedy throughout the whole show, all ready with a funny quip.

Fairy Bow-Bells and King Rat were the good and evil sides of the panto, Gabrielle with her clear and beautiful diction and Eva relishing in the "boos" she kept getting from the audience. Both were just what you needed as the juxtaposition of their parts, and both sang their songs well. Phoebe was well cast as Lady Fiona Fitzwarren (replacing the need for the Alderman) and was both stern and kind when needed to be. She worked well with all the other cast and was a pleasure to watch. Tommy the cat bounded through the piece with meows every now and then, and how she remembered not to sing, I do not know (I'd have been singing out and then going "whoops"), especially during the dances, which she took part in energetically, Purr-fect for the role. The principal boy and girl - Dick Whittington and Alice Fitzwarren - worked well together, you could see them smile as they danced and sang. Both of them acted the parts perfectly, with some real nice moments between them.



It's not easy to get away with a lot of the things an adult dame gets away with, but with Matilda as Sarah Suet, she goes just far enough. Making it silly for the kids but with a little bit of mild innuendo for the adults. Always brash whenever she's onstage with a fabulous set of costumes and audience rapport. Excellent. To bounce off the dame and get the audiences joining in with shout outs Bethany proved a hit. With a cheeky smile and a bounce in her step she joked her way through the entire panto, singing

dancing and adlibbing when necessary. A great overall performance and her songs and dances with the dame were a highlight of the panto.

Find all the blue words from the passage above in the grid opposite and then read the message in the unused letters!




Friday 28th April 6.30 pm

We were delighted to receive a bequest of £7,830 from Ethel Davy's estate just before Christmas. It has been added to the Mission Possible Appeal Fund - which has now reached its final £475,000 target. The Circuit Loan has been repaid and the main Appeal Fund has closed. Thanks again to everyone for your support and donations over the last 12 years. Local fundraising and donations raised £132,318 during that period - a tremendous achievement!

This year's fundraising and the funds received from the Co-op Local Community Fund last year have been transferred to our exciting new Mission Possible 2022-23 Projects Fund. See page 4 for details.

That leaves a final balance in the Appeal Fund of £2,900. Our Church Life Meeting agreed last month that this could go towards replacing the exterior Church Noticeboard, the Dishwasher and Solar Inverter and extending the ground floor storage space in the back corridor.
